On 14<sup>th</sup> of December 2014, SUZUKI Keisuke was re-elected to the Member of the House of Representatives and he was appointed to the Parliamentary Vice-Minister of Land, Infrastructure, Transport and Tourism and the Parliamentary Vice-Minister of Cabinet Office just after the election.

During his second term, he had been appointed to the Ranking member of the Committee on Foreign Affairs, the Committee on Rules and Administration. He also had several posts in LDP including the Acting Director of Finance Policy Division, Foreign Policy Division, Environment Policy Division and also Deputy Director-General of International Bureau.

Keisuke is known as principal member of the Working Team on North Korean issues, Structural Reform of Budget (Road Construction) and Corporate Tax Reform. He belongs to Former Prime Minister Aso's group.

Before he elected to the Member of the House of Representative on September 2005, he had worked as government official for the Ministry of Finance (MOF) since 1999. He mainly worked in the division of international finance and development policy. He also had experience of working as Examiner of Fukuoka Regional Taxation Bureau, Vice Council & Financial Attache at Consulate General of Japan in New York and Policy Section Chief of the Employment Measures for the Elderly and Persons with Disabilities Department for the Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare.

He studied political science and international law in the Faculty of Law, University of Tokyo, where he got his Bachelor degree. But mainly he spent his years as the crew of the Rowing team of University of Tokyo. He also spent a year as a Fellow in Foreign Service at Georgetown University.

He lives in Yokohama and serves as the Member of the House of the Representatives for Kanagawa 7th District. He is also the Intellectual Member of the Policy Council, The Japan Forum on International Relations, Inc.
